
Straight-line assimilation

Purpose

 A comparative analysis of the residential segregation of the children of immigrants in Toronto:

- 1. 1ST, 2ND, 3+ generations
- 2. Ethno-racial groups within 2nd generation
- 3. Evolving segregation of ethno-racial groups
- Impacts on social contacts and neighbourhood characteristics

Impacts of Segregation

PRO

- Ethnic economy
- Attachment to parents' culture and language

CON

- Isolates
 - Reduces scope and diversity of social contacts
 - Reduces access to job information
 - Reduces incentive to learn official languages
- Poverty
- Stigmatization


Empirical Analysis

- 2006 Census




1st Generation, Toronto CMA, 2006




2nd Generation, Toronto CMA, 2006




3+ Generation, Toronto CMA, 2006




NW European 2nd Generation




Southern European 2nd Generation



Chinese 2nd Generation





South Asian 2nd Generation

Preliminary Conclusions

- Some assimilation BUT racial segregation in every generation
- Within generations, avoidance of difference and attraction between 1st and 2nd
- Segregation limits social contacts of racialised minorities in 1st and 2nd generation
- Segregation affects
 neighbourhood characteristics
 only where 1st generation is
 concentrated
